




Introduction by Shafik Gabr

The goal of The Shafik Gabr Foundations, in both the US and Egypt, is to create a platform through which citizens can play a meaningful role in enhancing their futures; and while this clearly involves maximizing the use of technology, it also necessitates availing ourselves of the first and most important of man's inventions: communication.

Growing access to electronic and social media has spurred the notion that today's young adults are "global citizens," familiar with the cultures and issues of their compatriots around the world. But in reality, direct unmediated interaction between the Arab world and the West remains largely confined to elites of business and government, with most citizens relying on mass media to understand the world and its diverse populations. The notion that this offers any real context for deeper mutual understanding has proven false in region after region. In fact, stereotypes are becoming more pervasive, while suspicion, miscommunication, tensions, and conflicts continue to grow.

The Gabr Fellowship and other initiatives of the East-West: The Art of Dialogue provide a way to bridge these gaps in understanding in an immediate and tangible way. We are not only creating a new platform for young professionals to meet each other and experience first-hand the best—and sometimes the more challenging—aspects of Eastern



and Western culture. We are also providing a unique opportunity for Egyptian and American Fellows to identify issues, brainstorm ideas, assess needs and potential, and implement innovative, real-world solutions.

From creating digital communication portals to establishing networks of microclinics, small cohorts of 4-5 Fellows are accomplishing what national governments and international corporations often attempt to do: they are closing the divide between regions; creating workable, sustainable model programs; improving their societies; and stemming the erosion of public understanding.

The Gabr Fellowship has engaged some of the most accomplished and creative minds of this generation. As politicians on both sides of the Atlantic struggle to deal with new realities at home and on the global stage, these Fellows are able to explore options unstrained by political protocols or partisan priorities. They are melding their skills and experience with new visions and pioneering solutions that utilize the most innovative technologies, as well as the most basic element of success: human interaction. Through their participation and their projects, these Fellows are sowing the seeds of community and cooperation that promise to change our world view, our economies, and our future.

The Initiative

The Shafik Gabr Foundation's East-West Dialogue Initiative was feted in London, Washington, DC, and New York in November and December 2012. Diplomats and royalty, policymakers and media luminaries, business leaders and visionaries attended each event, united in their desire to recognize a program that would overtake the cultural hurdles that have long impacted East-West relations. By the following spring, 20 Gabr Fellows had been selected from the United States and Egypt. They represented the very best of their generation—professionals who have launched NGOs, created award-winning scientific platforms, and designed innovative buildings and facilities around the world. Some have dedicated their careers to civic service, others to global health causes, and yet others are advancing community and economic development through the arts. Through this program, they committed to join forces to develop and implement six projects that would address critical issues in one or both countries, while creating spaces for cooperative engagement and sustainable networking.

In June 2013, the 10 American and 10 Egyptian Fellows participated in a two-week program in Egypt, meeting with renowned figures in politics, business, governance, art, law, and media to discuss the challenges facing their societies and the obstacles to international cooperation. In October 2013, the Fellows traveled to the US, where they conducted a similar tour, enhancing their understanding of America's diverse cultures, eras, and events. These exchanges do more than introduce new cultures: they alter the very perceptions that have been forged by decades—even centuries—of misinformation. They provide the opportunity for frank discussions about the real issues impacting both regions, and forge alliances between leaders of the generation to which the gauntlet of cooperative alliances has been passed. They also highlight all that has shaped each regions' culture and outlook, the good events and the bad, and create opportunities to devise solutions that draw from, rather than relive, the past.


In this first year of the Gabr Fellowship, participants have acquired a greater understanding of both Egypt and the United States and the challenges faced by each and both. Having served as cultural, as well as linguistic, interpreters for each other, they now return to their homes to play the role of diplomat, introducing Egyptians and Americans to a people, a culture, and a future never before explored in this way. Together—through their cooperation and their projects—they are creating the legacy of the Gabr Fellowship: an international cohort dedicated to pursuing cooperative, collective solutions to their regions' most pressing issues.

The Foundations

The Gabr Fellowship - part of The East-West: The Art of Dialogue is an initiative of The Shafik Gabr Foundation designed to promote intercultural dialogue and collaboration between young emerging leaders from Egypt and America. The Fellowship is sponsored by The Shafik Gabr Foundation. The Shafik Gabr Foundation facilitates meaningful exchanges among young professionals from the US, Europe, and the MENA region, creating the cross-cultural dialogues and professional networks that are essential for peace and progress. With backgrounds from science, law, and media to entrepreneurship and the arts, the Gabr Fellows will identify new areas for cooperation and develop projects that will enhance community, civic, and economic development in both the East and West. The Shafik Gabr Foundation are committed to play a role in opening new channels for communication and development, and finding opportunity and growth between the next generation of Arab and American leaders.

The Shafik Gabr Foundation's (U.S.) mission is to promote greater mutual understanding between the peoples of the Middle East, Europe, and the Americas by fostering dialogue and the exchange of ideas. Established in 2012 in response to the erosion of sympathy and understanding between the Arab world and the West, the Foundation will sponsor exchanges between emerging and entrepreneurial leaders in the arts, science, law, entrepreneurship and media. The Fellows will work jointly to leverage their experience and launch projects that impact their peers and communities. The Foundation will work in partnership with other charitable organizations, corporations, and individuals to renew and strengthen the ties that have bound together Eastern and Western nations over many centuries. In the United States, the Foundation also supports epilepsy research, children with cerebral palsy, educational sponsorships, and special projects.

The Mohamed Shafik Gabr Foundation for Social Development (Egypt), the Gabr family foundation in Egypt has several initiatives underway. 
Jeff Walls Freelance Graphic Designer

Shared Distance

Team: Noha Eid, Alex Goldmark, Mohammed Mubarak

Goal

To help break down stereotypes, encourage interaction, and improve relations between the US and Egypt, as well as to make people rethink their preconceptions about each other. The project attempts to answer the following two questions: To what extent can an interactive urban intervention address the similarities and differences among people around the world? How could it affect the way people perceive their environment?

Issue

There is significant coverage of opinion polls depicting attitudes of "everyday Egyptians and Americans" toward their respective peoples, policies, and governments. Increasingly, the dominant attitudes are ones of disapproval or disaffection. Yet, those perceptions are largely driven by a second-hand understanding of the nation and its people.

Citizens' attitudes are essentially crafted by media stories about political leaders, complex events, and popular entertainment—none of which provide comprehensive portraits of the issues or citizens involved. In the most accessible media outlets, countries and their people are painted in broad strokes that overlook the cultural, economic, educational, and professional diversity in both societies. Add to this a lack of opportunity for "average" US and Egyptian citizens to interact with their counterparts, and the result is that these "everyday members of society" who are being surveyed are not providing opinions as much as reflecting images provided by the media. Egyptians and Americans lack the information necessary to offer truly informed opinions about each other.

During the Fellows program, team members recognized the critical role personal contact plays in breaking down stereotypes and prompting individuals to rethink preconceptions about other countries and their citizens. They recognized that the future of cross-cultural understanding and dialogue lies in creating opportunities for individuals representing the full spectrum of society to interact with their overseas

Project

Shared Distance will provide a forum for real-time, digitally enabled cross-cultural interactions between citizens from Egypt and the United States. Created as an urban art installation, two large screens—one in Cairo and the other in New York—will serve as communication portals. Individuals can engage in activities as simple as waving to each other or as complex as performing a group activity. The project will not pre-screen individuals, ensuring that the interactions are spontaneous, voluntary, cooperative, dynamic, and diverse in scope.

The interactions will be recorded and used in an archival video, which will be available online. Participants would be able to tag themselves and share the videos with others. This not only creates a living documentary of the exchanges, but provides opportunities to influence perceptions of greater numbers of individuals through a second-generation user experience. The Shared Distance experience can help to generate mutual respect, challenge perceptions, and bridge cultural chasms.





Re:Perception: A Creative Investigation of Cross-Cultura

Team: Mariam Ibrahim, Heba Safwat, Jeff Walls

Goal

To design and create an interactive application that will serve as an investigation into the process of perception, as well as a research tool. The application will help to codify and make tangible elements of the process of perception with the goal of stimulating and furthering dialogue and understanding of perception across cultures. The application aims to help users develop a more advanced awareness of how their perceptions are formed and thereby increase the ability to form discerning and informed opinions in an increasingly sensationalistic and saturated media environment.

Issue

As Gabr Fellows, the team recognized that the interactions and experiences offered by the program altered not just their perceptions of East and West, or Egyptian and American cultures, but also their understanding of how those perceptions were formed. The project draws from conversations among the Fellows during and after the Egyptian leg of the program, especially in regards to the way the political unrest in Egypt was depicted in the media.

The team understands that perception is a malleable and fallible process that, both consciously and unconsciously, shapes how we view the world around us. Despite what we may consciously believe or express, perceptual bias and emotion play a huge role in the human experience; a role that is often poorly understood and rarely addressed in full. Increasing awareness and understanding one's perceptive process are important steps in furthering dialogue between cultures and people, and this project seeks to provide a forum for informed discussion on this topic.



l Perception and Dialogue

Project

This project is centered around the creation of an interactive application that will serve two primary purposes. First, it will act as a creative exercise to evoke a deeper awareness and understanding of perceptive processes among users of the application. Second, it will act as a means of passively collecting data about how users respond to different written and visual cues, which will then serve to provide objective insights about how perception works, how certain symbols and words can evoke strong responses among users, and how the realities of perception can differ from assumptions.





Healthy Innovation by Empowering Cross-Cultura Team: Ahmed Ahmed, Haroun Habib, Amr Ismaeil, Leslie Lang

Goal

To address existing needs in the health and economic sectors through the introduction of microclinics, and the establishment of a foundation that will support the creation of similar health-sector entrepreneurial programs.

Issue

Egypt and the US find themselves facing a number of healthcare issues. Both countries have growing and aging populations which have shifted their healthcare priorities from infectious diseases to non-communicable diseases (NCDs) and other chronic diseases. In fact, NCDs represent a significant portion of the rising costs of healthcare in the US, and take a toll on the economy as they a result of their impact workforce productivity.

Both countries are also facing unemployment problems, particularly among youth. A recent report on work in Egypt stated that "young entrepreneurs need more training and mentoring in areas such as developing business plans and other core business skills." The same can be said about the next generation of American entrerpreneurs.

Microclinics, comprised of preexisting social groups of 2-8 people with shared access to education, technology, and social support, represent a paradigm shift in healthcare. In the US, they are emerging as a new healthcare model, specifically for the treatment of NCDs and other chronic diseases. The establishment of microclinics in Egypt would provide new healthcare options based on traditional social models while creating an opportunity to develop an entrepreneurial training program. It would also serve to facilitate Egyptian-American cooperation on healthcare, education, and business models that can have long-term benefits for both countries.

l Solutions

Project

This project will create a network of microclinics, as well as a training module to provide participants with pedagogical and hands-on experience identifying existing needs, creating practical solutions, and designing projects that can add value to the health and economic sectors of their own countries.

Program managers from a successful microclinic network in Kentucky will train Egyptian medical students from the University of Alexandria. This student volunteer cohort will recruit community members suffering from NCDs to participate in the program, and then launch the clinic—conducting screenings, educational sessions, and providing social support to promote healthy behaviors. Medical screenings will be conducted at the beginning and end of the project, providing measurable data on key health indicators to assess the impact and success of the project.

Meanwhile, participants will complete a 6-week guided course on "Health-focused Social Entrepreneurship and Innovation," created by the Gabr Fellowship team. Using an online platform, participants will learn market-based approaches, review case studies, and analyze how real-world healthcare issues have been solved through social entrepreneurship.

After completion of the course, Egyptian students will be matched with students from Boston University to form teams for a business plan competition. The projects will be charged with adding value to the Egyptian health system and providing real benefits to patients, families, and communities. Projects will be judged based on the degree of social impact, entrepreneurial ability, and real-world applicability.





Toward Sustained Renewable Energy Policy in Egypt

Team: Christina Fallon, Moataz Hussein, Morgan Williams

Goal

To foster the creation of a renewable energy infrastructure in Egypt by aligning technology, capital, and policies to create and sustain renewable energy development. The project will bring together policymakers from Egypt, the United States, and Europe to agree on a course of action that will accelerate the adoption of effective international and domestic policies to aid in renewable energy development and packaged energy solutions in Egypt.

Issue

As Egypt's population grows, so do the demands on energy suppliers. Energy consumption has increased by 240% since 1990, and is projected to double again by 2022. To maintain and augment the quality of life of its citizens, Egypt will have to at least double energy production by 2025. With a wealth of renewable energy sources—from the winds along the Red Sea to the solar capacity in Egypt's expansive deserts—the potential for creating a renewable energy sector is tremendous. In fact, the country has the potential to be a cost-effective supplier of renewable energy for the entire region. Recognizing the economic and environmental benefits of developing this sector, the Egyptian government threw its support behind the creation of renewable energy sources, even setting a target of meeting 20% of Egypt's energy demands via renewable energies by 2020. But deficiencies in policies, technologies, and on-the-ground capacity have prevented any real progress towards implementation. While the government has authorized some private financing of energy facilities, no specific regulatory framework has been created to support the goal or the industry. Further, in the absence of stable, focused policy and law in this area, investors are unlikely to come forward. There is a critical and immediate need for strategic engagement and leadership if Egypt is to meet its goals.

Project

This project focuses on hosting two conferences to create the policy and regulatory frameworks necessary to expedite the establishment of a viable Egyptian renewable energy sector.

The first event will be held in the spring of 2014, bringing together roughly 20 operations-level policy and energy experts from Egypt, the US, and Europe. These stakeholders will identify the key ingredients to a sensible renewable energy policy for Egypt, including complementary international policy measures that would support Egypt's domestic renewable energy industry. The group will openly assess Egypt's proposed renewable energy legislation; consider relevant policy concepts from other regions/countries; and develop a white paper analyzing current Egyptian energy policy and projecting the economic impact of establishing a renewable energy sector.

The second event will provide an opportunity for international experts and leading developers in renewable energy to meet with Egyptian decision-makers and stakeholders, to advance the case for public and private investment and policy support of projects that will encourage development of this sector. Participants will discuss barriers and strategies to progressive energy policies; economic and environmental benefits of implementing renewable energy programs; development and implementation of public education and outreach programs to support the sector; and the infrastructure necessary to secure domestic and international public- and private-sector investment.





LEAD-ETKALLEM.

Goal

There are two challenges we seek to resolve. First, there is no online space at present that brings together opinions, ideas, artistic work, historical context, and civil discourse focused on Egyptian-United States relations. Second, we pose the question: What's next? How and where do we continue to flourish the dialogue and the mission of the Gabr Fellowship?

Issue

These are tumultuous times for young people across the globe. In Egypt, the 2011 Revolution has not resulted in the transformation that many sought while the 2013 uprising has left the country in a state of uncertainty. Egyptian youth face high rates of unemployment, increasing gender discrimination, and censorship of ideas. In the United States, young people also face high unemployment, massive student loan debt, and uncertain futures. Across our respective nations, conversations are being had, information is being consumed in cafes, classrooms, studios, and homes.



Project

We propose the creation of LEAD/Etkalem, Etkalem being the Arabic word meaning "talk." LEAD/Etkalem provides the portal for purposeful dialogue at the human level, amongst the people, citizen to citizen dialogue. It will foster greater understanding between our cultures and countries. But how do we actualize this vision of LEAD/Etkalem - - and who will seek us out?

Our concept is to have *four distinct sections* to this website, based on the LEAD acronym

- 1 LEARN. In this area, visitors will have access to articles, opinion pieces, book recommendations, and our signature series of short videos that we're calling Etkalem, which will feature experts in their fields who will share insights and ideas about Egypt and the United States. These will be done in a Ted-talk like format.
- 2 EXPRESS. Here we will feature artists, music, and short stories that speak to the East/West dialogue and/ or the struggles these artists face in their respective countries articulating their message through various mediums of art.
- 3 ACT. Here we will feature links and information about the Gabr Fellows' action projects and other similar efforts in the US and Egypt.
- 4 DIALOGUE. This is the area for active engagement. We will have discussion forums, host redd-it "ask me anything" conversations, feature a twitter feed of recent posts, and have a weekly poll question featuring a hot topic on East/West relations.

Those are the four areas of LEAD/Etkalem.

Who are our target audience? Our readership and active participants start with the people who have helped the program and provided the Fellows with insight on history, art, politics, economics, development, and more and those who challenged our conventions. We ask your participation through submitting articles or creating Etkalem videos. Visitors will also include scholars and students of the East/West relationship. Others will be curious minds - young and old - who want to engage in the dialogue or share their own ideas or art. The YouTube videos, Reddit "ask me anythings" and interactive forums will drive new readers to the site.

Together, these four sections allow us to LEAD and Etkalem by establishing an online community to engage intellectual curiosity, artistic voices, committed problem-solving and ongoing dialogue. Whether passively consuming information and ideas or actively engaging in conversation and compelling projects, LEAD/Etkalem users will see a new, more thoughtful understanding and relationship emerge.

What's next? LEAD/Etkalem.

Digitized Comic: "Beyond Exceptionalism" - East/West Team: Beth Cartier, Ahmed Elhabibi, Amr Ismaeil, Daniel Lansberg-Rodríguez

Goal

To create a digital comic book which shares parallel stories of past and present events in Egypt and the US—such as the drafting of the US and Egyptian constitutions, Tahrir Square, and the US Civil War. These stories would highlight the similarities in themes, challenges, and successes of Egypt and the United States in such areas as the role of minorities, use of violence, and the transition to a democratic system.

Issue

Many societies, including Egypt and the United States, face the challenge of balancing nationalism and cultural pride with respect for the fundamental shared experiences of much of humanity. Reconciling the two, particularly within countries holding strongly exceptionalistic outlooks such as Egypt (given its rich history) and the United States (given its substantial present influence), is crucial if populations hope to learn from each other's mistakes. By carefully and accessibly organizing current events and placing them within the context of global history, the team seeks to give perspective and create an opportunity for that learning to occur.

The events of the Tamarrod have underscored the crucial role that youth movements and leaders can play in bringing about social and political change. By exploring issues and historical points such as these and tying them to parallel situations, the team will create a medium through which relevant ideas from the worlds of comparative law and political theory are made accessible to the young leaders of tomorrow in both countries: impassioned individuals who may benefit from better grounding in such areas but lack the time, resources, or will for intensive constitutional and historical study.



The Gabr Fellows are required to develop collaborative action projects to address one or more of the issues discussed relating to art, science, media, law or entrepreneurship.

The Gabr Fellowship seeks emerging leaders and young professionals in the areas of art, science, media, law and both social and business entrepreneurship. Applicants should have big ideas and a strong interest in transnational dialogue. All applicants must be 24 to 35 years of age and must be citizens of the United States or an Arab country. American applicants without prior travel to the Middle East and Arab applicants without prior travel to the United States are strongly encouraged to apply. Applications will be available online at www.eastwestdialogue.org beginning December 15, 2013. The first cohort will travel to Egypt in May 2014, and the United States in June 2014.


