
How has Israel achieved so much with their exceptional toolbox that included the term "anti-Semitic," and their miraculous abilities allowed them to achieve the impossible.




RJ JOHNSON, 2018 FELLOW

1) What are the 3 most important takeaways of your Gabr Fellowship experience?

- Sometimes your greatest connections and opportunities don't come from the people you know well, but the people you've just met
- Getting people into the same room is often 70% of the challenge
- No matter people's historical or cultural differences, it's easy to connect over even the smallest things

2) Would you visit Egypt again?
Without a doubt. I lived next door for nearly a year but never understood the role that the country plays in the wider Middle East ecosystem! Now that I understand its significance I feel like there is a lot more for me to learn.

3) What can make Egypt-US bilateral relations stronger?

• Identify Egypt's modern strengths on the world stage. What would Egypt like the US to recognize it for besides the Pyramids and its ancient history?

• I understood the power of relationships and networks before but I've seen Mr. Gabr take it to new levels. AI Creates More Work for Humans, Contributes to Burnout, Survey **Finds**

The rise of AI is supposed to help companies streamline their operations and will potentially take jobs away from humans. But a recent survey finds that generative AI tools burden employees with more work, not less.

Online freelancing platform Upwork commissioned a survey in the US, UK, Australia, and Canada to examine how AI has impacted the workplace. study polled 2,500 workers, half of whom are company executives; the other half are full-time employees or freelancers.

The survey found that 96% of executives expect AI to boost worker productivity. However, the same poll indicates workers are struggling to improve their efficiency with today's AI tools.

"Nearly half (47%) of employees using AI say they have no idea how to achieve the productivity gains their employers expect, and 77% say these tools have actually

decreased their productivity and systems is failing to unlock the added to their workload," the full expected productivity value study says.



Gabr Foundation Book **Movie Corner**

Gabr Fellow Jeremy Pesner recommends The Antisocial Network, which chronicles the now-famous "meme stock" of Gamestop. The stock was overinflated by a collaboration of amateur investors coordinating through the WallStreetBets subreddit. The response from the elite indicate just how tilted the stock market is in their favor.

Mr. Gabr recommends Elon Musk, Walter Isaacson's focused biography on the technological innovator. As an increasing amount of public infrastructure, from social media to rocket launches to satellite Internet, comes under his influence, it is essential to understand the emotions and motives of the man behind it all.

Mr. Gabr recommends Recount, a political drama film depicting the events surrounding the 2000 U.S. presidential election, particularly the contested vote count in Florida. The focus is on the intense legal and political battles that unfolded between the George W. Bush and Al Gore campaigns, and portrays the complexities and drama of the situation, emphasizing the impact of the recount on American politics.

Mr. Gabr recommends The Comey Rule, a 2020 political drama miniseries that explores former FBI Director James Comey's tenure during the 2016 U.S. presidential election and his interactions with President Donald Trump. The series covers the FBI's investigation into Hillary Clinton's emails, Russian interference in the election, and Comey's ethical struggles. The miniseries highlights the challenges of maintaining integrity in a politically charged environment.
