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HUMANITY AND HONESTY: WHERE ART THOU?

Lord Francis resides in a beautiful estate about an hour outside central London.

Annually he will invite me to a very special dinner where he gathers guests from literally around the world. Last year his dining table hosted 36 guests and although I did not count this time, it must have been a similar number, if not more.

It is a black-tie event and although I am not a fan of black-tie events, I complied each year and I arrived at 6:30pm on the dot as per the invitation.

After a 45 minute reception where I mixed with many of the guests after being welcomed by Lord Francis who inquired about my family and Egypt, we were led to the dining hall which amazes me every time by its size and the very high ceiling, the intricately detailed walls with his ancestor's portraits and a dozen Rembrandts, Caravaggios and Gérômes plus a huge Deutsch depicting the Egyptian "mahmal" going to Saudi Arabia.

Lord Francis had been to Saudi, Egypt, Jordan and Kuwait on multiple occasions and also had a home in Morocco where he would visit frequently with his extended family.

My seat at the dinner was between Jeff Randall, an American asset management firm owner and Elizabeth Sanderson, an Australian Senator. Facing me was Osman Sakur, a Turkish industrialist.

The dinner was beautifully choreographed, served by at least 40 servers with at least two orchestra conductor-type leaders impressively managing the servers incoming and outgoing. The menu had many options and I chose salmon for starters, followed by a grilled Dover sole and steamed vegetables, finishing with a mouth-watering chocolate fondue.

The conversation during dinner was light, entertaining and at the end of dinner, Lord Francis gave an amazing recognition of all his guests in a light but insightful manner. The group included Rose, a Belgian author and academic; Ramadan, an advisor to the Emir of Qatar; Ezra, an Israeli media CEO; Alex, a Russian energy billionaire; Soliman, a Saudi investor; David, an American journalist; Penny, a Singaporean hotel owner; Yulia, a Ukrainian model and agency owner in Paris; Giuseppe, an Italian politician; Andreas, an Argentinian IT entrepreneur; Yuanyun, a Chinese EV company owner; Patrice, a South African mine owner; Rahul, an Indian data center owner; Reza, a former Azerbaijani Minister of Investment;

Laila, a Moroccan parliament member; Josef, a German industrial defense owner; Sandro, a Brazilian crypto leader and former hacker; Gloria, a Kenyan real estate owner; Ralph, a Canadian aircraft charter owner; Cindy, a Swiss heiress; and Pierre, a French senator...

I lost track of the guests after Pierre was introduced. Lord Francis thanked us for attending and as the huge clock in the hallway noisily indicated its 9 pm with nine string gongs, we were invited for coffee, tea, cigars and sage conversation.

We walked across the massive hallway to another large hall with an ordained ceiling and heavy wood paneling on the walls, with two imposing marble fireplaces facing each other across the room.

Servers appeared with coffee, tea, liqueurs, cognac and cigars. I took a green tea and sat in a large semi-circle of plush sofas and large seats ordained with Lord Francis' crests.

As most in the room were regulars, we knew what was to follow. A candid discussion of the state of the world and what we expect to occur in the immediate future.

Chatham House rules, careful language, no speeches and precise moderation by Lord Francis were the carefully crafted mannerisms of the after-dinner discussion. Lord Francis turned to Rose and asked her if she could name how many conflicts exist in the world today.

Rose's answer, precise to the point, was that as of May 2025, numerous armed conflicts were ongoing worldwide, affecting millions and contributing to widespread humanitarian crises. The Geneva Academy's Rule of Law in Armed Conflicts (RULAC) project monitors over 110 active armed conflicts involving at least 55 states and more than 70 non-state armed groups.

I was taken aback as many in the room were more or less shocked by the figure of 110. Gloria erupted "Oh my God!" and David was shaking his head and commented that the world population did not have such a figure in their perception.

Osman, holding an unlit cigar, commented that, "The worst conflicts were in Sudan, Palestine-Israel and Ukraine-Russia."

Yuanyun added "Don't forget Myanmar, Ethiopia and Somalia."

Reza said, "Political violence increased by 25% globally in 2024 compared to 2023, with one in eight people exposed to conflict and over 250,000 people killed."

Lord Francis turned to Jeff and asked, "What is the financial cost of these conflicts?"

Jeff demurred and admitted he could not provide an answer but that it was in the trillions. Laila stood up and exclaimed, "It's not only the killing, it's the maiming, the injured, the starvation and destruction that the world does not see..." She took two steps towards a table to place her coffee cup and continued, "I went to Gaza to receive the body of a Moroccan journalist killed by a shot to the head and could not believe the hell I saw."

Before Lord Francis could take back the mantle of the discussion, Giusippe reflected in a quiet but audible voice, "We have lost our humanity and our moral compass has become mired in a blind fog."

Lord Francis noted Laila's emotional state and said, "We all have seen different challenging circumstances, but Laila has seen humanity at its worst."

Laila said, "I pray you never see children's body parts in the rubble rotting outside a morgue."

I could sense that the conversation was touching a chord amongst most of the group. Josef interjected that the world was a better place during the Cold War. All players knew the rules and played by them. Now it was a free for all and killing, bombing, massacring, injuring and destroying is an everyday sport. "It must stop." he finished.

As I heard the discussion continue, detailing how in Ethiopia tribes are slaughtering each other, Sudan's civil war was fueled by outside players and hearing of Yemen's famine and huge displacement, my mind went to the better days where human beings cooperated to make the world a better place. I remembered how I saw strangers help one another during the 1967 war, how I, standing in pouring rain in Austria, experienced a female driver stopping to drive me to a youth hostel in Vienna. There were no homeless people that I saw in the 70s in the major cities, as I see them everywhere now.

My mind returned to the discussion as Sandro was saying, "The world is experiencing an unprecedented number of conflicts, which appear increasingly intractable... violence from conflicts has risen dramatically by over 37 percent from 2023 to the end of 2024. If you want peace," he added," go to Iceland but remember President Trump's words!"

Lord Francis turned to David and asked "how is the US?" Before David could respond, Yulia responded clearly, "Unstable. President Trump's manner of ruling, opting for rule of the jungle rather than rule of law has created instability internally and globally." she explained in perfect English, with no accent.

David conceded that even though he is a Republican the Trump - Musk duo has created an atmosphere of uncertainty, stress, worry and tension. "It's amazing," he mentioned, "that Trump's shock and awe policies framed in America's Supreme Court's decision to grant President's total immunity for official acts, is the new

norm in Washington DC."

Cindy, who was usually a very quiet observer, said to Lord Francis in her Swiss-German accent, "As the world is losing its humanity let's not forget in parallel, we are losing our honesty. Fraud," Cindy gestured, "has increased in an unprecedented manner globally, driven by technology and evolving tactics used by fraudsters." Ralph agreed the increase was evident in both the volume of fraud attempts and the financial losses incurred by individuals and businesses.

David interjected as he shuffled in his seat stating that Americans in 2024 were defrauded to the tune of a billion dollars in an abundance of illegitimate schemes.

My mind wandered again. I remembered in the 70's and 80's when I concluded successful business transactions based on a handshake, whereas today with a battery of lawyers and auditors you were faced with shocking dishonesty and fraud on multiple levels, regardless of written contracts.

The clock in the hallway announced that it was 11pm. Lord Francis stood and we all followed. The next 15 minutes were warm goodbyes and exchange of last minute comments. I found Lord Francis, expressed my sincere appreciation and found my driver hovering at the entrance.

As I was driven home, I was worried that the coming generations will face the complications of increased conflicts, a lack of wise leadership, more dishonesty, enhanced technology, a greater dark web, more complicated crypto tools and AI tools defining a new world with less humanity, and an enhanced difficulty in defining fact and fiction.

Moreover, as Chairman of the Shafik Gabr Foundation, Gabr regularly hosts his interactive 'Expecting the Unexpected' working dinners in Cairo, Davos, London, Munich, and Washington, DC. The dinners are off the record and engage leaders across the board in timely predictions of geopolitical and geoeconomics issues. The most recent dinners were held in Davos on January 16th, 2025 during the World Economic Forum, and on February 16th, 2025 at the Munich Security Conference. The quests included former Presidents, Ministers, Ambassadors, U.S. Congress members, international organization chairs, heads of think tanks, business leaders, and distinguished scholars from Europe, the Middle East, the United States, and Asia. Gabr was previously the Chairman of the COMESA (Common Market for East and South Africa) Business Council and a member of the Executive Board of the International Chamber of Commerce (Paris). He also served on the advisory boards of

Zurich Financial Services and The Paul H. Nitze School of Advanced International Studies (SAIS). In June 2014, Mr. Gabr was awarded the Meridian Global Citizen Award in Washington D.C., and in November 2014, the Middle East Institute's Visionary Award. In March 2015, Gabr received the American University in Cairo's Global Impact Award in New York. In May 2016, Gabr was awarded the College of Mount Saint Vincent's Saint Vincent de Paul Award and Drew University's Peacebuilder Award. In September 2017, Gabr received the Policy Direction and Leadership Award from the London Center for Policy Research. Most recently, in November 2024, Gabr was awarded the highest honor conferred upon foreign nationals by the President of Italy: the 'Grande Ufficiale' (Grand Officer) of the 'Ordine della Stella d'Italia' (Order of the Star of Italy) for his extraordinary achievements and merit.

Since 2016, Gabr has focused his attention on innovation and investment in technology, as well as his Foundations. Gabr has invested in a wide spectrum of technology companies, ranging from startups to fully mature companies, and in many sectors in between. 
Through the Shafik Gabr Social Development Foundation, Gabr is helping to improve elementary-school education in Egypt, introducing students to arts and culture, and promoting sports and physical fitness for youth. In the area of higher education, Gabr is a major supporter of the American University in Cairo. The Foundation also developed a free medical-care system by providing "Medical Caravans" for residents of underprivileged areas of Greater Cairo. The Foundation established its first Medical and Social Development Center in Mokattam, Cairo, offering free medical and health services. In 2012, Gabr established the Shafik Gabr Foundation in the U.S., which supports educational and medical initiatives and, in November 2012, launched the 'East-West: The Art of Dialogue' initiative (see www.eastwestdialogue.org), promoting exchanges between young emerging leaders from the U.S. and Egypt with the purpose of cultural dialogue and bridge-building. At present, the Foundation's Fellowship program has 141 Fellows.

Mr. Gabr is recognized as one of the world's largest collectors of Orientalist art, amassing a unique and extensive collection that captures the beauty, culture, and history of the Middle East and North Africa. His collection showcases masterpieces from the 19th and early 20th centuries, reflecting the works of prominent Orientalist painters who were captivated by the region's vibrant landscapes, traditions, and people. Through his dedication and passion for preserving and sharing these historical artworks, Mr. Gabr has significantly contributed to fostering cultural appreciation and understanding of the Orientalist movement on a global scale.

ABOUT THE FELLOWSHIP

Launched in 2012, the Gabr Fellowship program helps connect and build constructive relationships between future leaders aged 24 and 35. Each year, the Fellowship consists of 20-24 Fellows, half of whom are men and the other half women, with an equal distribution between participants from the United States and Egypt. The Fellowship also accepts applicants from Jordan, Lebanon, France and the United Kingdom. Fellows represent a variety of sectors, including the arts, law, finance, tech, non-profits, and entrepreneurship – both business and social.

The mission of the Fellowship is to promote greater mutual understanding by building bridges between the two cultures by instigating dialogue and the exchange of ideas between emerging leaders from the United States and Egypt. Together, they explore one another's cultures, political realities, business trends and their goals for the future.

In addition to engaging in deep discussions with key stakeholders from both countries in business, government, academia, religion, science, tech and finance, all Fellows are invited to form multinational teams to complete an action project. These projects empower the Fellows as intercultural ambassadors, amplifying the Fellowship's reach and impact.

Ultimately, through hands-on activities, rigorous discussions, cultural site visits, and the collaborative action projects, the Fellows have a greater understanding of both countries and become part of an international cohort dedicated to building a more equitable and peaceful world.

On Friday, April 18th, Bassma Fahim had the honor of attending the launch of the #Empowerise Initiative—a heartfelt movement dedicated to giving a voice to those who cannot speak for themselves, with a particular focus on animal rights.

The event took place at Faten El Assra Animal Shelter, home to over 200 rescued dogs, all receiving the care and compassion they deserve. The occasion was further elevated by the presence and support of Their Royal Highnesses Prince His Excellency Mohamed Ali Farouk and Her Excellency Princess Noal Zaher Farouk, whose attendance added immense value to the cause.

Bassma shared the day with celebrated figures such as Hussein Fahmy and Mervat Amin, alongside a community of passionate advocates. During the event, she met TV presenter Sherine Hamdy, and they engaged in a meaningful conversation about the Foundation's mission, its support for the younger generation, and the potential for future collaboration. Uplifting Community Voices: Jude Husein, 2025 Fellow Advocates for Palestinian Recognition in Philadelphia

Jude Husein collaborated with the City of Philadelphia's Law Department and the Mayor's Office to rewrite the City's policy on the PHL Diversity Program, ensuring it was both fair and equitable. The policy allows communities with longstanding ties to Philadelphia to raise their flag in recognition. With roots dating back to the mid-1800s, Philadelphia's Palestinian community—made up of business owners, musicians, students, teachers, and professionals—clearly meets this standard.

Despite this, the City refused to raise the Palestinian flag, instead offering only a press conference in symbolic recognition. In December, during Philly's fourth annual Palestinian Solidarity Day—a tradition started in 2021 led by Husein— a way to celebrate her community. But since October 7th, she has faced increasing barriers to organizing the event, including Philadelphia Mayor Cherelle Parker's revocation of approval for the 2024 celebration.

Undeterred, Husein took matters into her own hands, she hired an airplane to fly it over the city for more than half the day. "The flagpole is too short," she remembered thinking. "The plane seemed like a good option."

Jude Husein serves as the Chief of State Advocacy and Strategic Initiatives at the Pennsylvania State Senate, where she leads efforts to advance equitable policies and community engagement across the state. She is also a board member of PHILADELPHIA250, an organization dedicated to creating an inclusive commemoration of the United States' 250th anniversary in 2026.

In her advocacy work, Husein has been instrumental in organizing Philadelphia's annual Palestinian Solidarity Day, an event she initiated in 2021 to celebrate and recognize the city's Palestinian community. Despite facing challenges, including the revocation of city approval for the 2024 celebration, she continued her efforts by arranging for a plane to fly the Palestinian flag over the city, symbolizing resilience and community pride.

Husein's dedication to social justice and community empowerment has been recognized through various accolades, including being named a 2023 Philadelphia Forty Under 40 honoree by City & State Pennsylvania.

UPDATES WITH CHAIRMAN

FELLOWSHIP DINNER IN WASHINGTON, D.C



On May 8, 2025, the Shafik Gabr Foundation convened a dinner for Gabr Fellows and special guests at I Ricchi in Washington, DC.

The Chairman of the Shafik Gabr Foundation, Mr. Shafik Gabr, his wife, Mrs. Gigi Gabr, Board Member Mohamed Ramzi, and staff were joined by 15 Fellows and six honored guests. Among the old and new friends of the Foundation in attendance were Mr. Moon Suflab, Administrator of Information Technology in the office of U.S. Senator Mitch McConnell; Barret Travis, a former U.S. diplomat and his wife Mrs. Deidre Travis; Anna Wheeler, Head of Partner Developments at C4ADS; Mayachel Schaller, Service Specialist at Mayo Clinic; and Savannah Lane, Associate Director of International Partnerships, Aspen Institute.

Referencing the increasing rates of conflict around the world, Mr. Gabr opened the dinner by reflecting on the importance of maintaining interpersonal networks and face-to-face engagement across national, political, and cultural divides. Mr. Gabr emphasized the Foundation's crucial work in nurturing a community of international leaders, where mutual understanding and support can produce real-life social and political solutions.

Throughout the evening, Gabr Fellows shared career and personal updates, including a range of entrepreneurial ventures from Jeremy Pesner, 2022 Fellow, and Dan Sullivan, 2013 Fellow; a resurgence of "Shakespeare in the Park", the public arts program championed by 2015 Fellow Murray Abeles; a fresh career pivot into the medical device industry for Hunter King, 2017 Fellow; an exciting new role for 2018 Fellow Charles S. Truxal as Chief of Staff for a member of the U.S. House of Representatives; 2025 Fellow Alphaeus Hanson attended the World Economic Forum Annual Meeting and attended Mr. Gabr's annual Expecting the Unexpected dinner in Davos, Switzerland; and 2025 Fellow Clara Sherwood's imminent achievement of a Master of Arts in International Affairs from George Washington University.



UPDATES WITH CHAIRMAN

2015 Fellow Robert "Kemp" Gouldin shared a big update from his Fellowship project: after proposing to use the funding provided by the fellowship to bring baseball to the children of Egypt, Kemp founded the 'Because Baseball' initiative. Now more than ten years later, 'Because Baseball' has helped to develop a Minor League in Egypt, and more than 3,000 Egyptian students have participated in the program. Kemp has secured independent funding beyond the initial support from the Shafik Gabr Foundation, including from professional Major League baseball players.

At the heart of the evening's events was a lively discussion of the future of innovation. The conversation ranged from defining – or disproving – the U.S.'s current innovative edge, structural challenges to technological progress in America, reflections on the inequality of technology access in both the Global South and rural America, and the ethics and possibilities of Al and gene editing. Fellows and guests discussed a variety of local, federal, and foreign policies that may be leveraged to improve basic governance and incentivize innovation for public health, computing, and global communication.

"The leaders of the free world must consider how they position themselves to advance universally beneficial values in the development of frontier technology, intergenerational resource transfer and capital allocation," reflected Alphaeus Hanson, 2025 Fellow. "The Gabr Foundation advances discussions and practical initiatives that platform emerging leaders across international borders."

With attendees from diverse fields of art, military service, business, finance, policy, and academia, and hailing both from Egypt and many corners of the U.S., the gathering was a living practice of the Shafik Gabr Foundation's initiative, East-West: The Art of the Dialogue.



In Memoriam of Dr. Laila El-Baradei



In Loving Memory of Dr. Laila El-Baradei (1961-2025): A Light That Will Never Dim by Nayra Gadallah, 2016 Gabr Fellow

It is with deep sorrow and enduring gratitude that I write these words in memory of Dr. Laila El- Baradei—an exceptional scholar, mentor, and human being—whose sudden departure on Friday, April 18, 2025, in a tragic car accident has left us all in disbelief. Her absence echoes across every space she once lit with her presence, but her legacy continues to guide us like the north star she so effortlessly was.

I first met Dr. Laila through the Youssef Jameel GAPP Public Leadership Fellowship at the American University in Cairo (AUC), where she served as the program advisor. Her role went far beyond academia; she was the heart of the fellowship, the architect of a community that felt like family. Through her vision, we bonded not only over our studies but over our shared experiences in Know Your Country trips, regular gatherings, and book clubs. Dr. Laila had a gift for creating spaces that nurtured both intellect and belonging.

Her academic brilliance was recognized internationally. In 2024, Dr. Laila made history by becoming the first Egyptian and Arab recipient of the International Public Administration Award from the American Society of Public Administration (ASPA)—a milestone that speaks to her lifelong dedication to excellence in public policy, governance, and leadership development.



In Memoriam of Dr. Laila El-Baradei

Beyond classrooms and conferences, Dr. Laila's teachings came alive in the moments we shared during travel. I had the privilege of accompanying her on two unforgettable trips—once to China and another to Aswan.

During those journeys, I learned that resilience can be graceful, and that true leadership often shows itself not through words, but through presence. Dr. Laila had a soul large enough to embrace everyone. Her radiant smile could pierce through the darkest of times, offering hope and warmth without asking for anything in return. Just a week before her passing, she had been busy organizing a trip to Turkey for the Jameel fellows to present their impact to donors—a trip meant to secure the future of the fellowship for generations to come. In true Dr. Laila's spirit, the fellows carried on with the trip, despite the heartbreak, demonstrating the very resilience she had instilled in us. Through tears and resolve, we proved that her lessons did not die with her, they live on through action.

Her students are now the torchbearers of her legacy. From the Milk Initiative—which seeks to provide nutritious school meals to underprivileged children in Egypt—to a scholarship launched in her name to support aspiring law students, Dr. Laila's vision continues to ripple through the lives she touched. And more initiatives are on the way, each one a testament to how deeply she inspired us.

On a personal note, Dr. Laila was always a source of unwavering encouragement. She fondly called me "Professor Ni," a nickname that carried more than affection, it carried faith. She believed in me long before I believed in myself. She paid attention to every detail, no matter how small, and this attention wasn't reserved just for me. After her passing, I was astonished to learn how many others had experienced her exact same care. It was as if she carried a piece of each of us in her heart.

Dr. Laila El-Baradei did not simply teach public policy. She taught us grace under pressure, the power of empathy, and the beauty of commitment. She was a professor in title, but in truth, she was a guiding light. Her legacy lives on - not only in awards or programs - but in the lives she transformed.

May we honor her by living the values she so deeply embodied: resilience, compassion, service, and hope.

To Dr. Laila, You are missed. You are loved. And you will never be forgotten.


